A referral letter is all we need — no imaging, no work-up. Our rooms arrange any investigations Dr Yas requires, and as a specialist he can request MRI with Medicare support where clinically indicated — an option not available on GP referral for adult knees and hips. One less task for your consult, and a smoother path for your patient.

Patients without private cover are equally well served through the public system, where Dr Yas consults at the Lyell McEwin and Modbury Hospitals — a public referral keeps them under his care, with waiting times set by SA Health.

Your pack is ready to hand over

Everything your GP needs is on page 1 — your score, what it means, and how to refer. Just three steps:

- 1 Book a standard appointment with your GP.**
- 2 Hand them page 1.**
Hand them page 1 with your score written in.
- 3 Have the conversation.**
Your GP knows your history and will help you decide whether a specialist opinion is the right next step. If you'd like it to come to us, they can address the referral to Dr Yas Edirisinghe. No X-rays or scans are needed first — we arrange any imaging Dr Yas requires.

Questions worth asking your GP

"Is my score and story enough to justify a specialist opinion, or should we try more non-surgical care first?"

"Can the referral be addressed to a surgeon by name?" (you are entitled to ask for this)

What happens next

If you hold private hospital cover

— this is the care our practice is built around. **You'll be seen within two weeks**, Dr Yas honours your fund's gap arrangements wherever possible — confirmed in writing before anything is booked — and any imaging is organised for you. Bring your medication list and health fund details.

If you don't have private cover

— you'll be well looked after in the public system, and you can stay under Dr Yas's care there: he consults at the Lyell McEwin and Modbury Hospitals. Ask your GP for a public referral; waiting times are set by SA Health.

If you are interested in self-funding your procedure privately, please enquire with our rooms first — the costs can be considerable, and we'll guide you through what's involved before you decide anything. Some patients access approved early release of superannuation for this purpose; our rooms can walk you through that path, and where clinically appropriate Dr Yas completes the specialist report the ATO requires.
